
## **President**

In 2021, we contributed **\$220,700** to students' Acorn Fund accounts, continuing to connect an increasing number of Salem students with the promise of higher education.

## **College Savings Program**

### Investing Today To Open The Door of Educational Opportunity Tomorrow

While this past year was no doubt challenging, we continued to support hundreds of Salem students by making an annual contribution to their Acorn Fund accounts.

Our Acorn Fund program invests in college savings accounts for each child living in or attending public school in Salem City.

Since 2016, we've watched the Acorn Fund and its impact on the community grow with excitement, as increasing numbers of students enroll in the program, and Acorn Scholars continue to enjoy the myriad opportunities afforded by higher education. We're proud to report that our Acorn Fund remains one of only a handful of programs across the country that makes annual contributions to college savings accounts established for every child in a given community from birth through their high school graduation.

In 2021, we also continued our tradition of distributing Graduation Bonus Awards to eligible account holders upon their high school graduation. Students who graduated from high school between 2016 and 2021 and are enrolled in the Acorn Fund can apply for this one-time award and receive an additional contribution to their Acorn Fund account.

# Acknowledging and Celebrating Exemplary Students and Future Community Leaders

Our work continually strives to embody the vision of Dr. Acton, our namesake and founder, who believed strongly in supporting Salem's passionate, intelligent and motivated students. In 2021, our commitment to that work intensified as we rewarded a record number of standout students with college scholarships through the Forman Scholars program.

Forman Scholars receive college scholarships of \$40,000 for use throughout their undergraduate college years. To be eligible, a student must be a senior who attends Salem High School or a Salem City resident attending high school. The Foundation strongly considers financial need, in addition to academic performance, as part of its selection process, and students must be enrolled in the Acorn Fund prior to applying.

Forman Scholars are not only provided a financial award to put toward their college expenses but they also are exposed to mentorship and networking opportunities that encourage them to connect with the Foundation's staff members and fellow Scholars.

## **Local Community Organizations**

### Lending a Helping Hand to Programs Helping Our Community

In 2021, we extended our support to organizations that provide Salem students with opportunities to evolve and succeed. We strongly believe in empowering Salem's youth in multiple ways, and the following organizations are valued partners who serve as extensions of our core mission. Here is just a selection of the nonprofit organizations we provided grants to this year:



### **One Village Alliance**

This organization spearheads a plethora of services aimed at supporting the Salem community. This year, we granted \$68,856 toward the organization's after-school and summer programs.



#### **Salem Community College**

SCC offers students the opportunity to attain associate degrees and certificates in a variety of fields. This year, we granted \$54,528 toward the College's dual-credit program, which allows Salem High School students to simultaneously earn high school and college credit for certain courses.



## **Response to COVID-19**

#### Offering Aid and Support As The Effects of the Pandemic Persist

The challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic persisted throughout 2021, and all students – but especially members of the Class of 2021 – continued to face challenges and disruptions. Recognizing the sustained ill effects of the pandemic, we once again offered our Acorn Fund account holders who graduated from high school the opportunity to have their initial college deposit paid for by the Foundation. Last year, we funded \$10,737 in college deposits to 16 different schools.
